In addition to the information outlined on this reference guide, all forms of PPE are required if:

- care for someone with suspected, probable or confirmed COVID-19
- undertake clinical examination or collect specimens from people who have suspected, probable or confirmed COVID-19
- have significant contact with people who have fever or acute respiratory symptoms work directly with patients or residents in an area with significant community transmission community transmission is defined by jurisdictional public health authorities

Contact and droplet-based precautions should be implemented when HenderCare workers are providing care to people with undiagnosed respiratory infections and or aerosol-generating tasks.

Masks must be worn if stipulated in the service recipient's care plan or advised by HenderCare. All team members have a responsibility to check local state or territory health websites for regular updates regarding health and quarantine advice.

Persons for whom wearing a face mask would create a risk to that person's health and safety related to their work, as determined through OH&S guidelines. Persons whose professions require clear enunciation or visibility of their mouth. This includes teaching or live broadcasting. When directed to remove the face mask to ascertain identity. A person who is a student while onsite at a primary school or outside school hours care. Persons are engaged in any strenuous physical exercise During emergencies.
NSW	Required	 Surgical face masks are required to be worn during services. TAS	Required	 Surgical face masks are required to be worn during services. 	Where masks are required, exceptions to wearing one include: Children aged under 12 years or those undertaking primary education Anyone who has medical certification (or other documentation from a medical practitioner) of a physical or mental health, condition or disability that makes wearing a fitted mask unsuitable Anyone with an exemption from the Director of Public Health or their delegate. You must apply for this exemption. Examples include removing your mask for compassionate reasons i.e. providing end of life care. Reasons for not wearing a mask are not always obvious, so please be respectful of

others.
